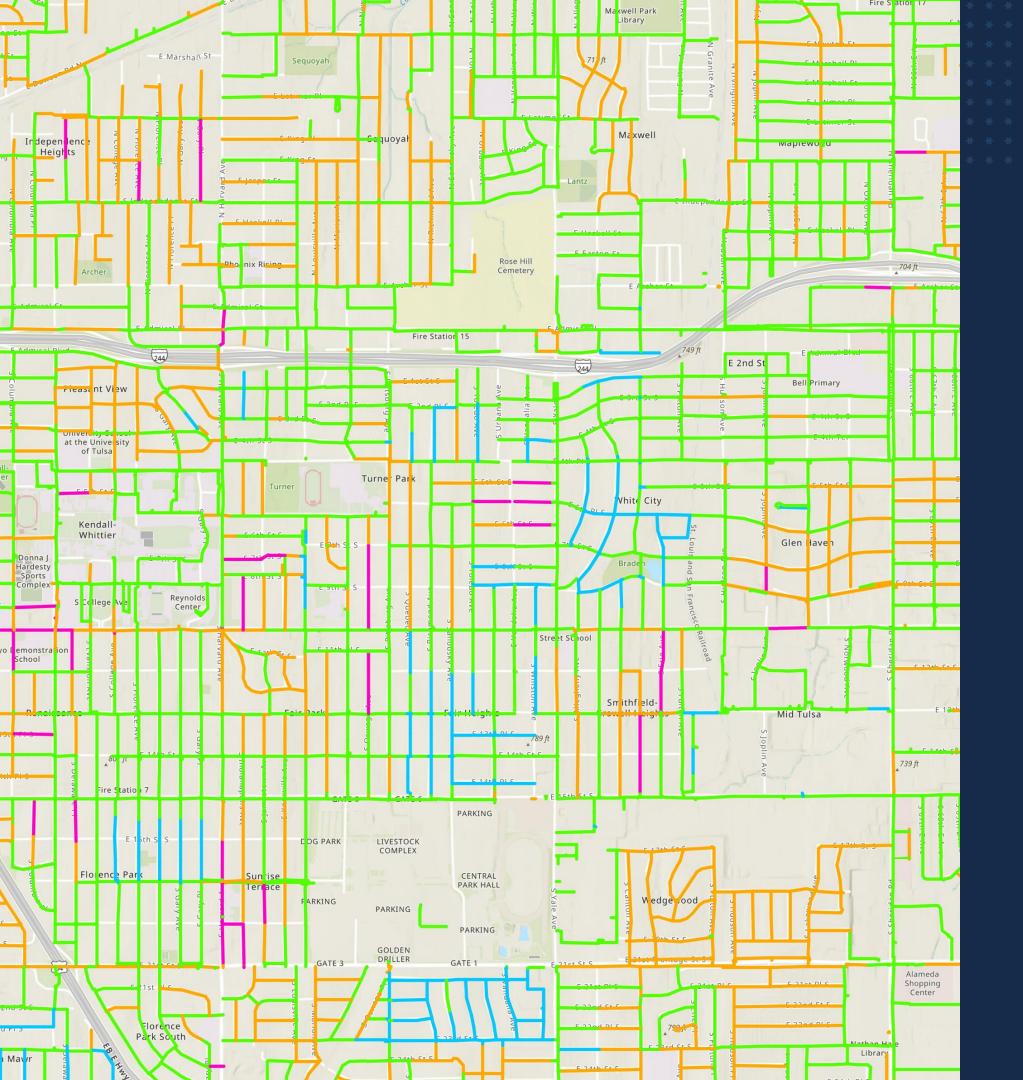

- Endorsing private service line and flood insurance





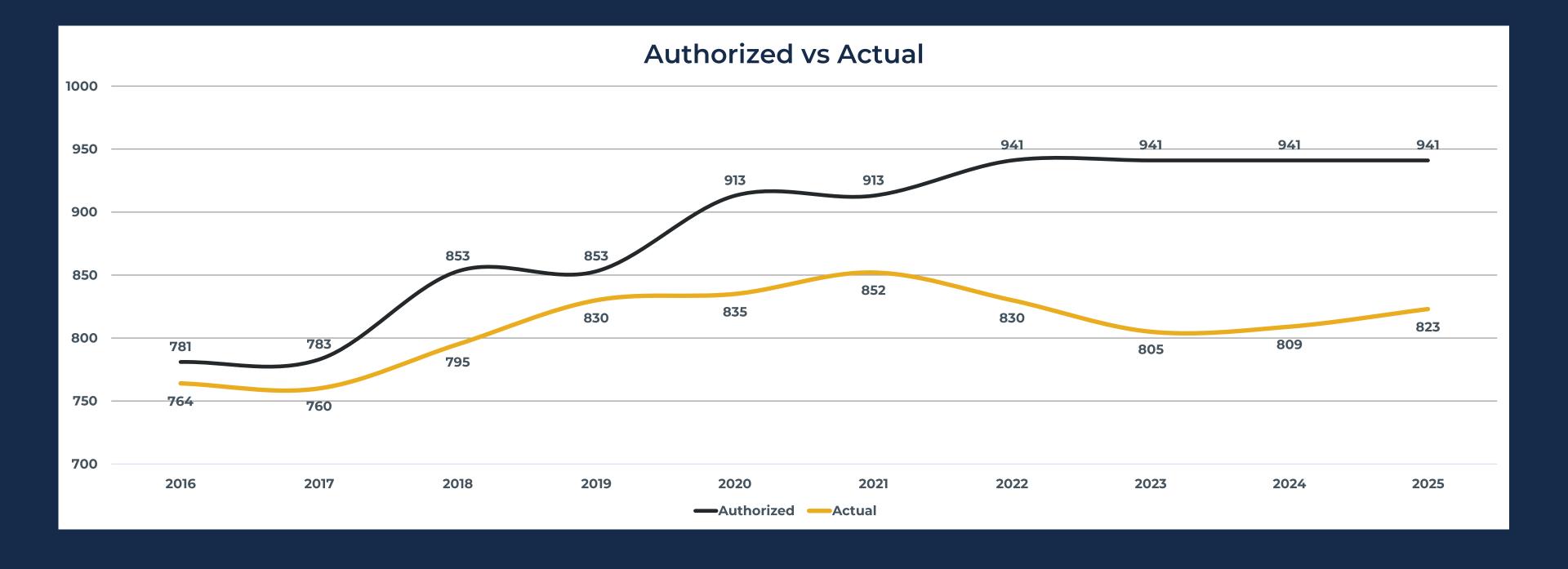

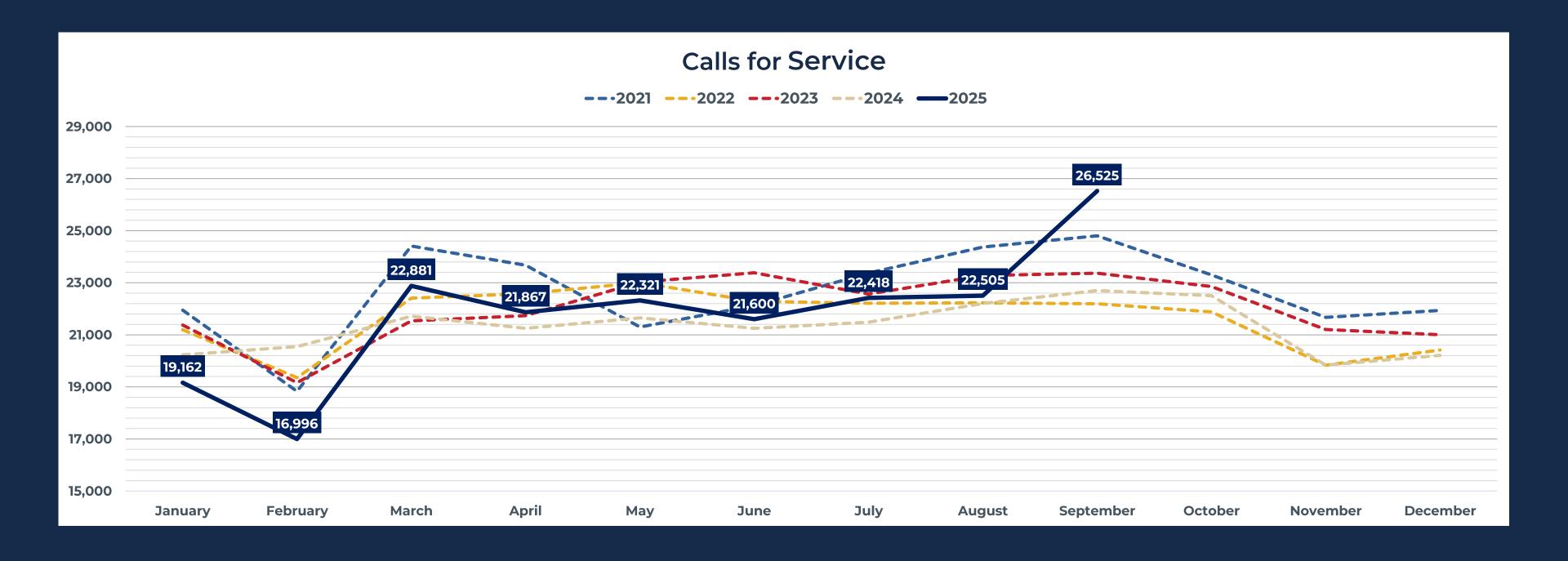


## Tulsa Police Personnel Numbers



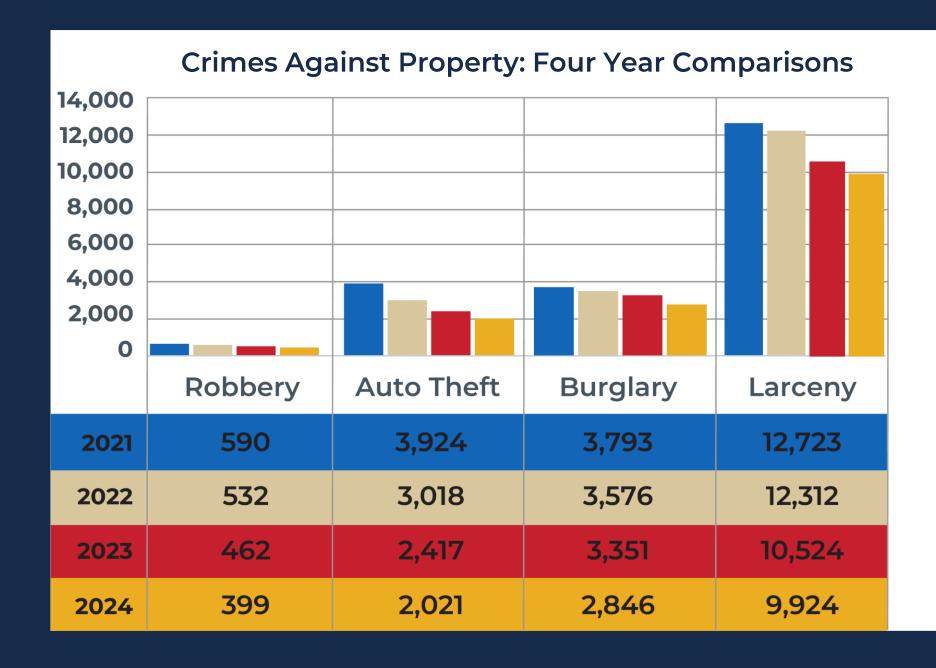


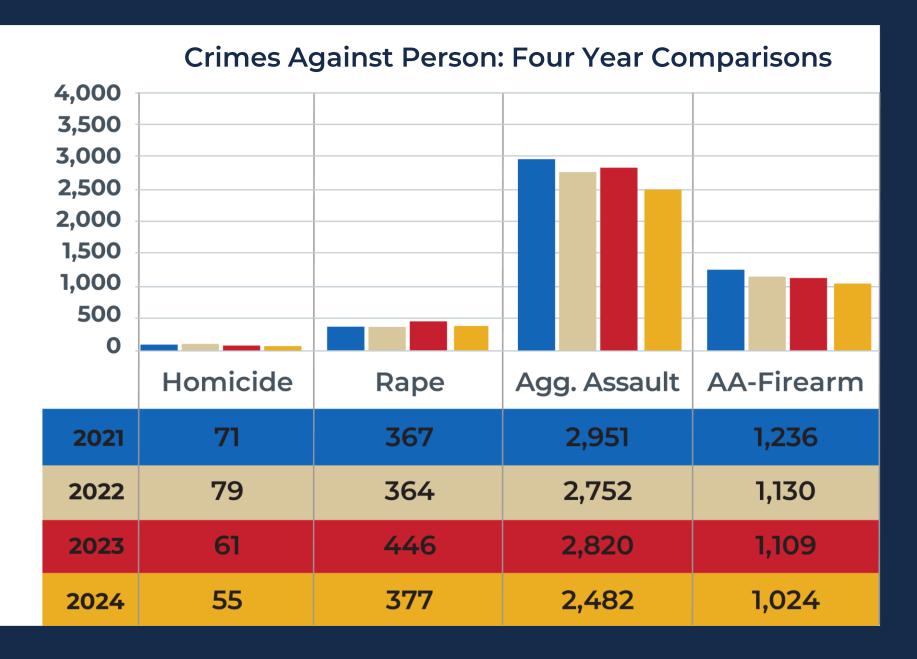

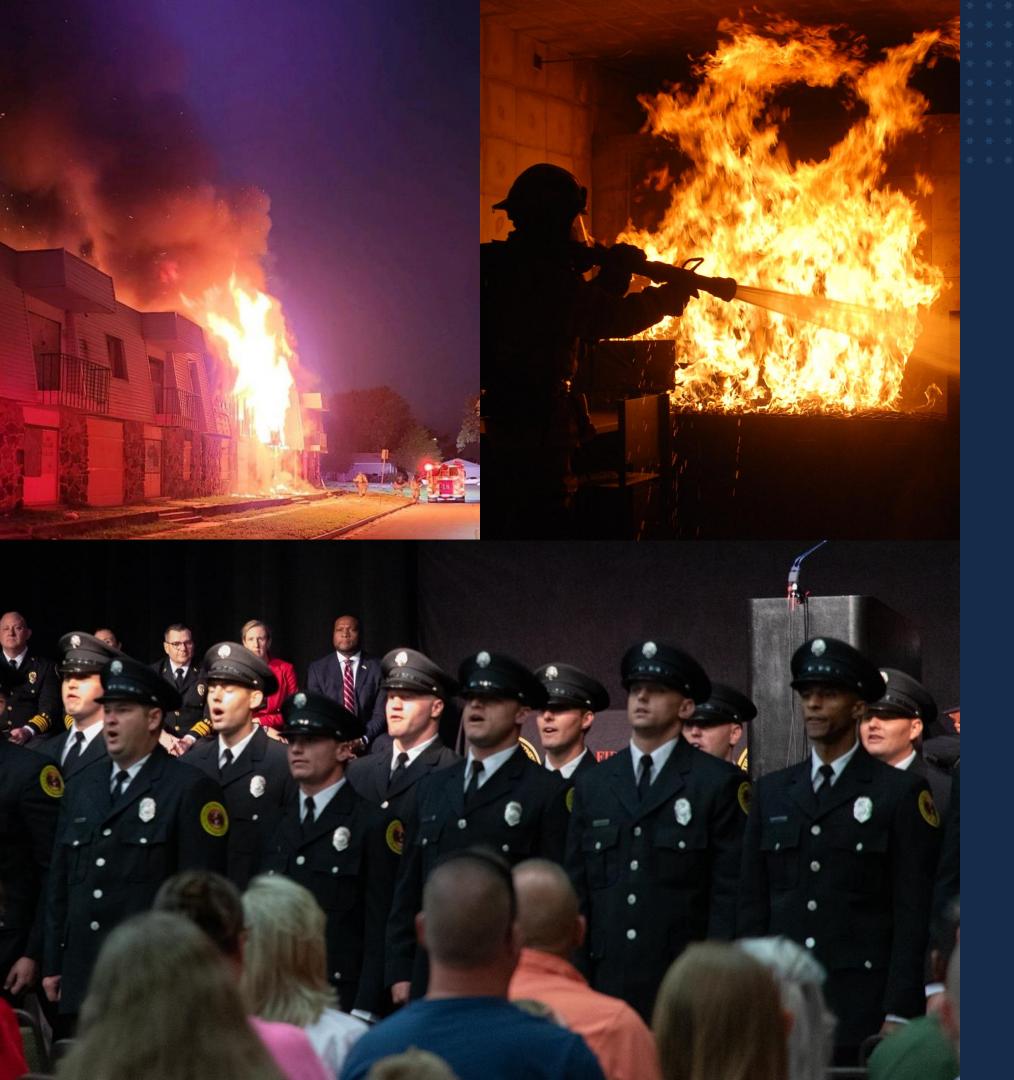






# Tulsa Fire Overview

- Recently completed our ISO Class 1 Renewal. Keeping insurance rates as low as possible for Tulsa
- Requests for service remain over 6,000 per month with EMS remaining the majority of incident types
- **Automative Vehicle Location (AVL)** technology has improved the arrival of the first two apparatus specifically on our fire related incidents.
- Recruit Academy of 24 graduated on July 24th and a new academy class of 25 started on October 6th.





# Tulsa Fire Overview

- Completed a 60-Day Drone as First Responder Program (DFR) in August and September of 2025
- Fire apparatus fleet continues to improve with all frontline apparatus newer than 2017
- TFD Community and Mental Health Programs continue to reduce the demand on emergency operations. Client case load varies between 75 and 95 per month
- Downtown Tulsa Alternative Response Team – 2 expanded to cover weekends which ensures 7-day a week coverage





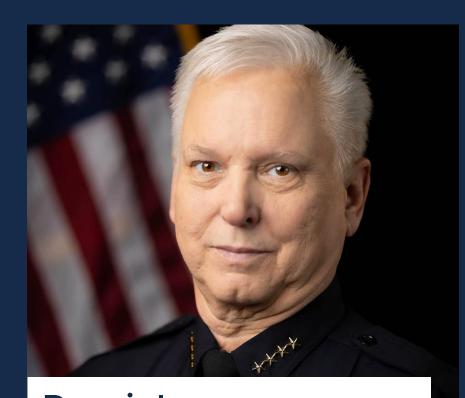
