Homelessness Goals

- Mayor's Goal: Achieve Functional Zero Homelessness by 2030
- Public Sector Leadership: Mayor's Senior Advisor on Homelessness
- Private Sector Leadership: New Partnerships with Philanthropy and Business Community Creating a Public/Private Initiative
- Lead Agency: Housing Solutions
 - Building capacity for past five years to take charge and organize the service ecosystem.

Homeless Shelters and Intervention

Shelters and Current Operations

- Current system design flaws causes our shelter beds to fill and overflow, results in encampments, inappropriate use of public spaces, and migration across the city in search of supports.
- Early Interventions
- Offering early intervention and long-term support will unclog shelter-bed overflow and reduce the number of people sleeping outside.





Safe Move Tulsa Overview

- Reorganize and Amplify Homeless Services to Quickly and Effectively Serve Everyone
 - New to Homelessness: Focus on immediate interventions and rapid resolution.
 - Long-Term Homelessness: Focus on urgent, deeper intervention needs.
 - High Needs/Complex Cases: Activate Complex
 Case Team drawing from mental health systems,
 hospitals and law enforcement to bring homeless
 individuals experiencing mental health crises into
 institutional care and discharge them to
 appropriate long-term care environments.







Safe Move Tulsa Phases

Eliminate and Prevent Street Sleeping

- Rehouse and support 300 individuals to stabilize and recover in first nine months.
- Support up to 1,000 individuals experiencing firsttime homelessness to quickly return to housing.
- Budget \$10 million (City committed \$6 million from Opioid and ARPA funding and \$4 million from private grants).


Scale Effective Shelter Flow


- Help people avoid shelters with early interventions.
- Activate shelters to quickly return individuals to stable housing, opening shelter-bed capacity.
- Equip community service providers to offer immediate interventions to individuals with long histories in our homeless system.

Housing Goal

Create 13,000 Housing Units Over 10 Years

- **Streamline Building Processes**
 - Housing Acceleration Team streamlines the building permit and inspection process.
 - Hired consultant to improves building permit processes and provide downloadable preapproved plans available to individuals and builders.
- **Establish New Partnerships**
 - Partner with Housing Partnership Network and Mercy Housing to focus on affordable housing goals.
- Provide and Maintain the **City Housing Tracker**









Housing Challenges

- 46% of Tulsans Spend More Than the Recommended 1/3 of Income Towards **Housing Costs**
- Lack of Affordable Housing is the Primary Cause of Homelessness
- 41% Increase in Rent Since 2019 (Faster than average wage increases.)
- Decline in Federal and State Funding
- 12-36 Months Average Wait Time to Receive Housing Vouchers

Housing Goal

Reducing Problematic, Unsafe or Unsanitary Properties

- Community Builder Pilot Program
 - Incentivize property owners to turn vacant, abandoned and dilapidated properties into affordable homes.
- New State Bill HB2147
 - Implement State Bill HB2147 and adopt City resolution and processes.
- Identify Properties and Contact Owners
- Improve Our Tulsa 3
 - Utilize available funds for rehabilitation and preservation.





Housing Challenges

- Increases in Construction and Property Maintenance Costs including Mortgage Rates and Taxes
- Average Age of Homes in the U.S. is 40 Years Old
- \$100 Billion Average Costs to U.S. Homeowners for Needed Maintenance







Housing Goal

Implement Improve Our Tulsa 3 Housing Dollars (\$75 million)

- Research Similar Cities and Best Practices
- Review the Progress of Developments
 - 10,000 units in planning and construction stages since April.
 - \$500 million in funding gap was identified.
- Partner with Housing Partnership Network as a Third-Party Administrator
 - Help leverage City dollars and provide gap financing to developers.
- **Issue Bonds**
 - Procure \$35 million of the \$75 million in the coming months, as opposed to over the next five years.







Housing Challenges

Need to Invest Approximately \$245 Million Annually

(Source: March 2023 Tulsa Citywide Housing (Needs) Assessment by Development Strategies and Homebase)

- \$185 million (76%) private investments.
- \$23 million (9%) in public programs and investments.
- \$37 million (15%) funding gap; \$370 million over 10 years.




