

Human Rights Commission

PURPOSE

The Human Rights Commission (HRC) of the City of Tulsa serves in an advisory capacity to the Mayor and City Council by conducting research; recommending policies, programs, and initiatives; and advocating to promote and protect the rights of vulnerable and disadvantaged groups.

HRC receives regular reports from the City's Compliance Officer, who is responsible for investigating complaints of discrimination regarding housing, public accommodations, employment practices by City contractors, and concerns related to the Americans with Disabilities Act.

HRC is supported by the City's Department of Resilience and Equity and contributes to Resilient Tulsa, a community-level strategy to address pressing challenges, build capacity, unite residents, and position Tulsa as a world-class city.

The Human Rights Commission is comprised of 15 members appointed by the Mayor and approved by City Council. Membership includes liaisons from the African American, Hispanic/Latinx, Indian, Asian, and Women's Commissions; advocates for veterans, individuals with disabilities, and 2SLGBTQIA+ communities; and members-at-large.
