Raku Firings



June 9, July 14, August 11 • 9 a.m. - noon

WaterWorks Art Center now offers Raku firings on the second Saturday of each month (weather permitting). All pieces (maximum size/piece: 12" x 12" x 12") are fired and price per firing is based on size. Pieces must be pre-fired to a bisque state; you may glaze all pieces when you bring them in no later than the FIRST Saturday of the month. Patrons are allowed to observe and help with newspaper ONLY. Students must be entered onto the Raku Log in the office (pre-payment is required). Firings may be postponed due to wind and weather conditions.

Beginning Pottery Wheel

Instructor: Yusuf Etudaiye



This eight-session class is designed for anyone interested in learning how to throw on the pottery wheel. Students learn clay-forming techniques and develop an understanding and appreciation for both the studio process and hand-craftsmanship. Students learn how to center clay on the wheel, make cylinders, and pull coffee mugs and bowls. Step-by-step instruction provides the basic how-to information needed to complete one or more glazed projects. Each student needs 25 lbs. of clay and basic clay tools for the first evening of class. These items may be purchased from WaterWorks for \$20 and \$10, respectively.

Beginning/Intermediate Hand-building and Sculpture Experience

Resident Teaching Artist, Yusuf Etudaiye, guides students in a six-session class designed for beginners and experienced clay artists alike. Students learn to use the slab roller, extruder, and other tools used in the construction of sculptural objects as well as slumping, press molding, and finishing techniques. Beginner-level students will obtain a good foundation in hand-building and sculpting; for those who have some background in these areas, more information and an enhanced level of expertise will be gained.

Each student needs 25 lbs. of brown clay and clay tools for this workshop. These materials may be purchased at WaterWorks for \$20 and \$10, respectively. Glazes and kiln firings are included in the tuition.

Intermediate Pottery Wheel

Students continue to hone their skills by learning to make objects such as a tea pots, pitchers, and plates. Clay tool kits (\$10/kit), brown clay (\$20), and off-white clay (\$25) are available for purchase at WaterWorks Art Center.

Bronze Metal Clay

Whether you are starting your journey into metal clay or have a desire to enhance your skills, Fast Fire Bronze metal clay is a wonderful medium to explore. Students will make three or four sets of earrings and three or four pendants using 100 grams of clay. Construction techniques demonstrated and taught include single layer pendant and earrings, domed shapes, double layering, applique and bail fabrication options. The fundamentals of metal clay design, fabrication and finishing are explored during this five-session class. A kit fee of \$45 (payable to instructor) covers all materials.



One-Day Soldering Boot Camp

Let's spend an intensive day of learning about all types of soldering! While students won't make anything to take home, they gain some valuable experience and learn new soldering techniques. Instructor demonstrations include pallion, pick, paste, and wire soldering. Students try different types of flux and anti-fluxes in this fast-paced, one-day workshop. Participants should wear old clothes or an apron. If time permits, soldering problems and solutions may be discussed as a group or individually. A kit fee of \$15 (payable to the instructor) covers all materials. Tools are provided and shared. Safety policies and procedures must be followed at all times in the Jewelry Room.

Box Chain Bracelet

Come and learn to make a beautiful chain maille-patterned bracelet in this three-session class. This relaxing method of jewelry making is fun to learn and a skill that can be done at home with only a few tools. Students are provided two chain-nose pliers for use in class and may be taken home with a nominal deposit (refunded to the student when the tools are returned at the end of class). Aluminum rings and a base metal toggle are provided for a kit fee of \$15 (payable to the instructor). Options for sterling, argentium, or other metals are discussed and may be ordered in the first class session, if desired. Tools are provided and shared. Safety policies and procedures must be followed at all times in the Jewelry Room.

All skill levels are welcome - no experience is necessary. A kit fee of \$25 covers all materials. Tools are provided and shared. This very popular class is limited to seven (7) students.

Just in time for summer, here's your opportunity to create a colorful wind chime using Bullseye sheet glass, frit and stringers. Pieces will be tack-fused to retain the dimensional aspect of the designs. Once fired, students assemble their creations using glass beads as embellishments. Students experience cutting glass, adhering hardware to hang the chimes, and stringing and crimping beads during this two-session class. A kit fee of \$25 (payable to the instructor) covers all class project materials. All skill levels are welcome.

Students experience cutting glass, adhering hardware, and stringing and crimping beads during this three-session class. All skill levels are welcome. A kit fee of \$30 (payable to the instructor) covers all materials needed.

The Art of Relief Printmaking Workshop

Relief printing is a printmaking process where protruding surfaces of the printing plate or block are inked and recessed areas are ink free. The process of inking the face of the matrix and bringing it in firm contact with the paper is explored using linoleum blocks with rollers, brayers, and hand. Step-by-step instruction and examples of relief prints are provided in this one-day workshop. Open to all levels of experience - all materials are provided.

Intermediate/Advanced Expressive Watercolor Workshop

Watercolor is a simple medium that allows for maximum expressive qualities. Learn how to translate people, pets, still life, and figures through this beautiful art form. This intermediate-advanced level workshop provides a guided exploration for students to discover their own style and how to express it combining fundamentals of the medium with advanced techniques. This workshop is designed for those with watercolor experience or who have taken the introductory Expressive Watercolor classes. Focus is placed on working from a reference photo and in transferring the image into a unique expression. A kit fee of \$45 (payable to the instructor) provides materials, if desired, with an option to purchase other supplies if warranted. The kit includes two brushes, three tubes of watercolor (artist choice) and one sheet of 22" x 30" watercolor paper.

Weaving Overshot Stars & Roses: \(\frac{1}{\sqrt{N}} \) 12 Patterns on 6 Overshot Threadings

If any weave structure deserves the title the American Weave, it is 4-shaft overshot. While it probably originated in Scotland, once it crossed the Atlantic to North America in the late 18th century, it literally blossomed into hundreds of eye-dazzling coverlet patterns that were woven across the United States and Canada during the 19th and early 20th centuries.

In this class, participants will each thread a loom with one of six classic overshot patterns using natural white cotton. Then, with the pattern weft color of their choice they will weave two different 13" square panels (one "star fashion" and one "rose fashion"). After completing panels on the loom they warped, students will exchange looms and weave two more panels on each of the other five looms. When complete, each participant will have panels with 12 different overshot patterns, suitable for assembly into a small coverlet.

Time outside the regular class periods is required in order to complete all 12 panels of this project.

Instructor approval required: Students must be able to read and follow a weaving draft, wind a warp and dress a loom without assistance.

Exploring the Color Red with Natural Dyes Workshop

This class covers how lasting reds from natural dues were produced on cloth. Natural dyes included, but not limited to, are madder, cochineal, lac, and Brazil wood. Students learn how to manipulate each color using pH and temperature. The history of each dye is discussed and each student will leave class with samples and recipes for making your own beautiful red natural dyes. Students should wear old clothes and/or a dye apron. Rubber gloves (like those used for house cleaning) are desirable. A kit fee of \$15 (payable to the instructor) provides all necessary materials.

The Blues: Dyeing with Indigo and Woad



Intermediate/Advanced Cherokee Double-Wall Basket Weaving Two-Day Workshop

This two-Saturday-session workshop is designed for students who have some experience weaving baskets or have taken the introductory workshop in Cherokee Double-Wall Basket weaving. The techniques taught include making and shaping the base, learning to weave with two runners instead of one, adding more spokes to support a larger basket and reducing spokes to create more diverse shapes. Each student creates their own unique basket with the option of using hand-dyed reeds to incorporate the element of color and design into their basket. A kit fee of \$45 (payable to the instructor in cash at the beginning of the workshop) provides all necessary materials. This is a wet process; students should bring a towel from home and perhaps an apron. Pre-requisite: previous basket weaving experience or Beginning Cherokee Double-Wall Basket Workshop.
